MARINE SYLLABUS APPROVED

There can't be too many students who can study topics like marine biology, oceanography, navigation, speed boat driving and sailing as well as qualifying for a marine radio licence and skindiving certificate all in the one course that can count for university entry.

In 1985, a proposal was made to the Board of Secondary School Studies in Queensland to trial such a course. With infinite wisdom and the good judgement of trusting a bunch of young, motivated and highly committed teachers, the Board set about the long process of developing such a syllabus. Supported by 25 Government and Non Government Schools the syllabus is finally finished.

CONFERENCE LAUNCH

To celebrate the event, teachers from all over Queensland gathered on Stradbroke Island in August to officially launch the syllabus and fine tune the elements. Its interesting to note that this syllabus has come from the teachers of the subject at the work face.

The conference focused on practical sessions and the now famous "show and tell" where teachers share with their peers, the day to day practical classroom hints that are real gems. You know with all the in-service we get in the new culture, we often forget that when we started teaching, the most useful things to us as beginning teachers were the practical overheads or those simple demonstrations.

It was a real pleasure to see these practical things again - and with such enthusiasm since many of us have been at it now for 10 or more years. Thanks to Col Colston who organised us all over and back.

Pioneering schools



Its not easy to write in this area. To overcome this inadequacy, Wet Paper is purchasing under licence, Aboriginal and Islander stories written by our first Australians.


Stories of the Rainbow Serpent will be mixed with the theory of continental drift and how the turtle got its shell, will go with the text on classification of Class Reptilia.





WET PAPER WORKSHOPS

In 1995 we are planning a series of one day discover marine studies workshops. Phil King has stuck his hand up to help organise the Coffs Harbour Workshop and Denise Wright from Rockhampton Grammar School looks set to go as well.

THE AIM OF THE WORKSHOPS IS SIMPLE

To assist schools use Wet Paper products. Once the students manual is out, we want to show how to use it and provide you with the opportunity to ask questions about the course as well as network with other teachers in your area.

DISCOVER MARINE STUDIES

These sessions can be flexible and link with existing state projects. All water quality is linked to the national Waterwatch program. All boating is linked to AYF syllabi but focuses on State regulations.

The following topics can be covered

Hypothetical bay, videos, radios, inexpensive ways to teach navigation, charts, equipment and excursion ideas. Knots, equipment, making models, videos, equipment, lab experiments, cartesian diver, boyle's law. How to build a marine aquarium, keeping live animals and plants, plankton analysis and staining, fish and prawn dissections, skeleton making, coral analysis, fish printing and casting. Model building, sea water analysis, salinity, current measuring devices, beach studies, wave tanks, sand analysis. Water pollution, drain spraying, role plays, faecal coliform detection.

IRON MAN HARRY

We flew up Harry Briedahl earlier this year to learn how Victoria was getting on in the field of Marine Studies. There seems to be no Marine Studies Syllabus yet on the drawing boards in Vic so maybe there may be another angle to promoting the wonderful subject.

Is there a market for a Junior Marine Biology book? Can it be taught in Junior Science or Environmental Studies and how many will buy a copy?

LINKS WITH WATERWATCH

Following successful talks with Waterwatch State reps Derek Foster (Qld), Renato Ramsay (NSW) and Paul Reiffer (WA), I am going to link the water quality monitoring section from Chapter 13 of the old book to the national Waterwatch materials where possible. Common tests in dissolved oxygen, turbidity, pH, faecal coliforms have been established and we have signed a deal with Streamwatch, to reproduce the methods used in their publication. States are then free to follow interpretative data and other protocols specific to their state.

MARINE AQUARIUMS

John has given us a licence to reprint the chapter in the revised book and provide us with advice on student activities for the students manual.

Wet Paper has found that this instrument is very reliable in determining nitrate and phosphate concentrations in seawater and Selbys has offered to set up a free collection service for the cadmium waste until HACH USA comes up with an alternative chemical method.
